Kentucky Updates - November 2021

Local and State News:

- U.S. News & World Report recently published an article detailing some of the <u>issues Kentuckians</u> face in regards to tobacco product use. The article highlights many of the challenges associated with tobacco-control.
- Louisville Metro Council voted 15-11 not to accept a <u>cigar bar amendment</u> to the city's comprehensive smoke-free ordinance. The proposal to exempt cigar bars would have resulted in Louisville losing its status as a comprehensive smoke-free city.
- The Central Kentucky American Heart Association has launched a social media <u>campaign targeting</u> <u>teen vaping</u>, featuring students Claire and Will.

National News:

- A new study revealed <u>e-cigarette use during pregnancy</u> was associated with a 33% increased likelihood of a low-birth-weight baby.
- In the first settlement between a state and an e-cigarette manufacturer, <u>JUUL will pay North Carolina</u> \$40 million and will alter its sales and marketing tactics in the state after the state's attorney general sued the company for marketing its products to underage consumers.

Other Items of interest:

- Teen cessation help online: American Lung Association has launched a free new online tool
 called <u>NOT for Me</u>. This program repurposes the successful <u>Not On Tobacco (NOT) program</u> in a selfpaced, online way.
- A new Truth Initiative article shares <u>five key actions</u> needed to reverse the youth e-cigarette epidemic, while a new <u>blog post on thirdhand smoke</u> explains how it may lower the ability to fight infections and worsen respiratory illness.
- The Kentucky Tobacco Prevention & Cessation Program has created a new Kentucky Tobacco-Free School Toolkit. This is a compilation of e-cigarette resources that address prevention, treatment, and intervention for schools. A hard copy of the toolkit with supplemental materials was mailed to the attention of all 6th-12th grade principals, in all public and private schools across Kentucky in early September.
